Looking forward to the fall of 2009, help support the **eMa-Hi Times**.



It was made of concrete and about 4 foot long with a back to it. I think it was donated by one of those 30's classes. I was sorry to see it not there but could understand how it could disintegrate when trying to be moved. Good to hear

from you. Boy time really flies; it seems like just yesterday when we were all growing up in Coos Bay. All the best.

it's another foggy morning, cold and damp. and after hurrying to ready ourselves for school, the four of us were trailing down the hill to catch our school bus. tho it was

still quite dark out, we were laughing and talking about some adventures we had that weekend.

it was then, that my older sister double-dared me to climb over the fence gate where the steers were grazing at the other end of the field. now, she knew i was scared to death of those steers because they invariably would spot me and come galloping at me at a heated pace. but the double-dare was too much or i temporarily lost my sanity thinking i could outrun them or jump back over the gate.

so over i went, here they came, and i lost my footing on the dewy grass. trying to get to the gate became a lost cause so reaching the post that held the barbwire, i scrambled to exit there instead. well, there went my new skirt getting caught and ripping in the wire! but once

over, i did manage to get to the door of the bus. thankfully, it had been a little late.

so started my day. our first bus was a little one. maybe 10 seats in all. we left Daniels Creek and met with the Dellwood bus at Coos River school. transferring there to head to the third bus waiting (or not) under the Allegany bridge with the kids from that area. if there was room to sit in a seat, we would. otherwise, it became "laptime". that's when the girls would soon find the right guy's lap to scramble onto. if they lucky, it would be the "hunk of the week".

our trips were an hour and a half---one way! the kids in town were already in their transition from the 8 o'clock classes to the 9 o'clock classes when we would arrive at school. our day's in school started at 9 and ended at 4. we usually arrived

home around 6. it made for a very long day.

that is, if the buses ran smoothly, the transfers went ok, or no bus problems. sometimes the little bus would maybe have a little problem. could be a slide on the road, a washout, a tree in the way, or being bumped off the road into a ditch by a log truck. once, our bus hung over a cliff as on a turn the brakes went out. but not to worry, we just crawled out the back emergency door expecting the adventure or seeing the bus teetering and maybe going over.

so went the days to school and back. we could say the "town" kids had an advantage of the 8 to 3 classes, shorter days, etc. but, sometimes, with a smile, the thought of their short, humdrum trips to school must have been very boring. there is a lot to be said about

riding three buses, transfers, close encounters with other kids (ahem-sometimes too close), and the adventure of just getting to and from school that kept us wondering... what's in store for us today. it certainly was not the highlight of school that stands out, rather our trips!
